AMBASSADOR MARK GREEN, MR. JOHN MONAHAN AND REAR ADMIRAL TIMOTHY ZIEMER

Mark Green is currently the Managing Director of the Malaria Policy Center in Washington, D.C. He also serves as a board member of such organizations as the Center for U.S. Global Leadership and WorldTeach. Prior to his current position, Mark served as United States Ambassador to the United Republic of Tanzania. As Ambassador, he worked tirelessly to build lasting relationships between the United States and the government and people of Tanzania. He emphasized projects that fostered economic growth, enhanced security partnerships and assisted Tanzanian leaders in their fight against diseases like malaria and HIV/AIDS. From 1990 to 2006, Mark was elected to four terms in the U.S. House of Representatives. As a member of the International Relations Committee, he played a lead role in crafting the Millennium Challenge Act, America's historic commitment to invest in developing nations that are pursuing political and economic reforms. He also played an important role in crafting the Global Access to HIV/AIDS Prevention, Awareness and Treatment Act of 2001, and the United States Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria Act.

John Monahan is currently the Special Advisor for Global Health Partnerships at the U.S. Department of State, Office of the Global AIDS Coordinator. He was previously at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), where he was a Counselor to the Secretary and Interim Director of the Office of Global Health Affairs. Prior to that, Mr. Monahan served as Senior Fellow at the Annie E. Casey Foundation and held a number of senior positions in HHS during the Clinton Administration, including Director of Intergovernmental Affairs (1993-1996), and Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary for Children and Families (1996-1999). He has also served as Legal Counsel to Senator David Pryor (1990-1992) and as an Investigator for the Senate Special Committee on Aging. Mr. Monahan has also served in a number of academic appointments, including as a Visiting Professor of Law and Executive Director of the O'Neill Institute for National and Global Health Law at Georgetown University, as well as a Non-Resident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution's Center for Urban and Metropolitan Policy and as a Senior Fellow with the Center for the Study of Social Policy.

Timothy Ziemer was appointed in June 2006 to lead the President's Malaria Initiative (PMI), a historic \$1.2 billion, five-year initiative to control malaria in Africa. In 2008, the Lantos-Hyde Act authorized an expansion of PMI, and in 2009 it was included as a key component of the U.S. Government's Global Health Initiative. The PMI strategy is targeted to achieve Africa-wide impact by halving the burden of malaria in 70 percent of at-risk populations in sub-Saharan Africa, approximately 450 million people, thereby removing malaria as a major public health problem and promoting economic growth and development throughout the region. PMI is a collaborative U.S. Government effort led by the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) in conjunction with the Department of Health and Human Services (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention), the Department of State, the White House, and others.
