


# How a Police Chief, a Governor and a Sociologist Would Spend \$100 Billion to Solve the Opioid Crisis

The American opioid epidemic has defied all efforts to contain it, and the number of overdose deaths continues to grow. President Trump directed the Department of Health and Human Services to declare the opioid crisis a public health emergency in October and said "we have to do something about it" in his <u>State of the Union</u> address, but his administration has yet to pursue a specific strategy.

# Colorado's Proposed and Final Distribution Agreement: MOU

### Allocation Proposal

#### Attorney General's Proposal


- 15% directly to state
- 15% directly to counties/ cities
- 70% directly into a state abatement fund

#### Agreement Moving Forward

- 20% direct allocation to local governments
- 60% direct allocation to regions
- 10% for infrastructure
- 10% direct allocation to state

### **Other Considerations**
