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Disability Rights Protections: Generally

- What? Federal disability rights laws protects individuals with disabilities from discriminatory treatment, when that treatment is based on disability.
- Who? A disability is a physical or mental impairment that affects one or more major life functions.
- Who must Places of Employment
 - comply? State or Local Governments
 - Places of Public Accommodations
 - Recipients of Federal Funds
 - Dwellings

What Law Applies?



Who? A disability is a physical or mental impairment that affects one or more major life functions.

Addiction is a Disability

Physical or mental impairment includes, but

asymptomatic), tuberculosis, drug addiction, and alcoholism.



What is a Dwelling?

"Dwelling" means any building, structure, or portion thereof which is occupied as, or designed or intended for occupancy as, a residence by one or more families, and any vacant land which is offered for sale or lease for the construction or location thereon of any such building, structure, or portion thereof.

"Family" includes a single individual.

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This includes sober homes, by whatever name they choose to be called: sober-living facility, residential recovery home, transitional housing, halfway houses, etc.



Treatment intertwined with disability

Treatment is inherently linked to disability. So when barriers are created for treatment, those barriers cannot be disentangled from disability.

See Doe v. Deer Mountain Day Camp, Inc., 682 F. Supp. 2d 324 (N.D.N.Y. 2010)

"Even assuming the truth of Defendants' allegations, however, the fact that Adam may take medications with certain side effects is inseparable from the fact that Adam is HIV-positive. Discriminating against Adam because of medicinal side effects, therefore, still constitutes discrimination on the basis of Adam's disability."

Barriers to Treatment are unlawful

Courts have routinely found that barriers to medications for OUD violate disability rights statutes.

See Pesce v. Coppinger, 355 F.Supp.3d 35 (D. Mass. 2018); Smith v. Aroostook County, 376 F.Supp,3d 146 (D. Maine 2018); M.C. v. Jefferson Cnty., N.Y., 2022 WL 1541462, at *4 (N.D.N.Y. May 16, 2022).

Putting it all together

Sober home settings that have policies denying admissions to people because those people are prescribed a particular medication for OUD could violate federal civil rights statutes, including the Fair Housing Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act.



One more thing: Sexual Exploitation in Housing

Under the Fair Housing Act, landlords–including sober home operators–cannot demand sexual favors in exchange for rent or other privileges. Even when this conduct may not be criminal.
